

e candidate overshoots mark

TRUMBULL - David Grabiec set what might be considered a lofty goal - collect 1,000 winter coats to donate to the Bridgeport Rescue Mission.

However, the Bagle Scout candidate more than doubled that goal when the number of parkas, car coats and snowsuits he collected tallied 2,274.

"It was a little more than we were expecting," said Michael Cobb, director of operations at the rescue mission. "It's helping a lot of peo-

Grabiec, 17, decided to col-

lect coats for the community project required to earn Boy Scouting's highest award rather than the more traditional nature trail or disabled-access ramp.

"This is something a little different that I think will be better in the long run," Grabiec said.

Organization was key, the Trumbull High School junior said

He had three people assist him - a communications coordinator, a transportation coordinator and a storage container coordinator.

Grabiec collaborated with 22 groups, mostly area church-

es, where he set up collection boxes.

With the help of volunteers

and fellow members of Scout Troop 67, the coats were collected, sorted and bagged and the last group of coats was de-livered to the Bridgeport mission in December.

He said he originally planned to complete the collection by Thanksgiving week-end, but "people kept dropping coats off on my back porch after the deadline.

Grabiec didn't take just any coats, though, "Some had broken zippers, or stuff crusted on them. I tossed those in the garbage," he said.

The rescue mission has

been distributing the coats to the needy through its shelter and its mobile soup kitchen.

In fact, Grablec went along on the mobile soup kitchen one night, which he calls a life

changing experience.
"We don't know how fortunate we are until we under stand the needs of some of our neighbors," he said. "I pray that this coat drive is a blessing to them."

"It really has been a blessing," said Lynn Egan, the rescue mission's development director.

March 25th, The River Hills Memorial Race, Pico Mountain



SLOPESIDE: FRACTIONAL-OWNERSHIP By Diana Mason

This is a follow-up on an article I wrote for the Skizette a few months ago on "elite" slopeside private clubs that many areas have already built or are in process of building.

Now, the "hottest trend" in ski industry real estate, comes, "fractional-ownership condo hotels", also known as quarter-share properties.

We all know how busy and hectic our lives are, and the reality for many families is that they can't get to their ski house every weekend as they optimistically planned.

Enter these time-shared condos that cater to families and couples who still want to have a "second home", but can't get away every weekend.

The most common arrangement is to buy 13 weeks a year for a condo unit in a hotel-like setting. The 13 weeks are usually spread throughout the year, so the owner can use the unit one out of every four weeks, although other time options are available.

These projects are usually developed by the ski resorts, and the hotel model offers amenities like valet parking, daily housekeeping, on-site restaurants, fitness centers, hot tubs, and pools; and some offer private lounges and locker rooms.

Since the properties are open to the public, there is rental income potential for the condo owners if not being used for weekend or a week. Fractional-share owners pay more than one-fourth of the cost of a typical wholly-owned condo.

These condos also the best of both worlds for the ski resorts as occupancy rates and the number of lift tickets are increased. Off-ski season the resorts can now offer mountain biking, golf, and hiking to further fill the condos and restaurants.

Hunter Mountain opened the Kaatskill Mountain Club, a 77-unit ski-in, ski-out condo last August, and had, like many recent fractional projects, sold almost all units within the first year. Prices at Hunter, which began

selling before completion, ranged from \$35K for quartershare studios (they now go for \$58-210K) to \$190K for penthouse suites.

Fractional-share projects have sprung up in Okemo, Killington, Mount Snow, and other resorts around the country.

So, all River Hills members, say thank you to our wonderful lodge!! Keep it running smoothly; volunteer more, give back to the club for the many weekends, weeks, and days spent in the beautiful Green Mountains of Vermont---without having to purchase your own house or condo.

The club asks little enough from its members, but we need more members--and friends of members---to volunteer when called upon, to keep the lodge running efficiently and to maintain it. Please step up to the call. Currently, we need volunteers to install sound absorbing in our dining room/kitchen. Let's get the job done now!


